






























On board the SS Sheepshead Bay Victory Ship 6 day – April, 1946







Various Messersmit jet fighters. They not only had the jets, but they were operational, they had many. Lucky for us, they had little or no jet fuel.



15 Nov 42 activated at Ft Jackson S.C. and moved 17 Nov 43 to Second Army No.4 Tennessee Maneuvers; transferred to Ft Bragg N.C. 18 Jan 44 and staged at Cp Kilmer N.J. 30 Sep 44 until departed New York P/E 6 Oct 44; arrived in France 20 Oct 44 and entered Germany 22 Mar 45; arrived Hampton Roads P/E 10 Jan 46 and inactivated same date at Cp Patrick Henry Va.

100th Infantry Division Combat Narrative

The division arrived at Marseille France on 20 Oct 44 and elements went into combat at St Remy in the Vosges Mountains on 1 Nov 44. From 1-9 Nov 44 the division relieved the 45th Inf Div, and attacked on 12 Nov 44 as the 397th and 399th Inf crossed the Meurthe River at Baccarat to outflank Raon-l'Etape. Defeating a German counterattack on 13 Nov 44 the division advanced into Raon-l'Etape 18 Nov 44, which fell after the 397th Inf seized the Quarry Strongpoint. The division took Moyonmoutier without opposition 21 Nov 44 and overran St Blaise 23 Nov 44, the Vosges Mtns advance being halted on 26 Nov 44. The division arrived in the Saarebourg sector and relieved the 44th Inf Div on 27 Nov 44, where elements held the Saverne Gap Bridgehead while the rest of the division rehabilitated.

The division began the drive on Bitche 3 Dec 44, clearing Meisenthal and surrounding Mouterhouse by 6 Dec 44 and fighting the Battle for Lemberg 8-9 Dec 44 and the Battle for Reyersweiler 11-13 Dec 44. The division then fought the Battle for Fort Schiesseck, near Bitche, 14-20 Dec 44. The division was then ordered into holding positions south of Bitche due to the German Ardennes Counteroffensive. The German NORDWIND Offensive of 1 Jan 45 caused the division to give ground, but by 8 Jan 45 it was improving its positions on local attacks. The division attacked again toward Bitche on 15 Mar 45 and fought past Maginot forts to take the town the next day. On 18 Mar 45 the division was relieved from the line and reached the Rhine on 24 Mar 45.

The division crossed the Rhine on 31 Mar 45 and relieved the 63rd Inf Div near Neckargemund. It attacked 1 Apr 45 southeast along the Neckar River behind the 10th Armd Div against disorganized resistance. The 398th Inf crossed the Neckar at Neckargartach and established a bridgehead in heavy combat. The division then fought the Battle for Heilbronn 4–12 Apr 45, which fell only after house-to-house fighting. The 398th Inf fought the Battle for Jagstfeld 6–11 Apr 45 while attempting to expand its Offenau Bridgehead. The division then rapidly advanced behind the 10th Armd Div and took Loewenstein on 16 Apr 45. The 397th Inf reached the Murr River at Sulzbach 19-20 Apr 45; the 398th Inf crossed the Murr at Murrhardt 19 Apr 45; and the 399th Inf battled for the heights at Beilstein in the Neckar River Valley 18–19 Apr 45. The division then drove rapidly to Stuttgart which it reached on 21 Apr 45 as bridges were taken across the Rems River. The division mopped up pockets of resistance east of Stuttgart along the Neckar and confined further activity to patrolling. It relocated to Goppingen 30 Apr 45 for military government duty, and was serving in that capacity when hostilities were declared ended on 7 May 45.

Enlists In Army, Will Not Use Deferment

Leroy Hudson Barr, 254 North Olive street, does not want and cannot now use the draft deferment granted to him by the district selective service appeals board. He has already enlisted in the Army, and is now at Camp Perry, awaiting assignment.

The appeal for deferment was filed by his employer, the Romec Pump Company, after the Elyria draft board had placed Barr in Class 1-A Barr did not want a deferment however, so he applied for permission to enlist. The board granted the permit last week

Yesterday the board received 11 decisions from the appeals board, and found that the appeals board had continued 1-A classifications in 10 of the cases. The only one changed was Barr's classification. He was placed in Class 3-B by the appeals board. But Barr is now in the Army, by his own choice, so the change in classification has no effect.

The local draft board had not teceived any official notice of his enlistment today, but it knew that he was planning to enlist so it is not surprised to learn that he did
