Colonel Andrew Christian Tychsen was born in Haddon Field, New Jersey, June 27, 1893, but moved with his family to St. Paul, Minnesota. He began his military career at 11, when he joined the St. Paul's Boy Brigade, rising to Corporal at 13.

After attending the University of Minnesota, in April 1914 he joined the Minnesota National Guard. He served on the Mexican border as a First Sergeant in Company A of the First Minnesota Infantry, in 1916. A year later he was a Captain, commanding the 339th machine-gun battalion, of the 88th Division. In July, 1918, he arrived in France with his unit, and returned to this country in the summer of 1919.

With the end of World War I, he remained in the Army as a Regular Army officer. Between 1927 and 1932, he attended St. Paul's Military Academy, leaving in 1932 to command Company K of the 27th Division in Hawaii. Promoted to Major in 1935, he attended Command and General Staff School and was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in 1940. In December, 1941, he took over command of the 6th Infantry Regiment at Fort McLellan, Alabama, and was promoted to Colonel. He has commanded the 399th Infantry Regiment since activation of the 100th Division.

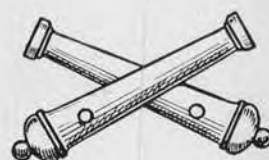

Colonel Henry Winston Holt was born in Staunton, Virginia, on July 4, 1896, and attended the Virginia Military Institute until he received an appointment to the United States Military Academy. Upon his graduation from West Point in 1918, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Field Artillery and assigned to the 16th Division. After the Armistice of World War I, he was sent to Coblenz, Germany, as part of the Army of Occupation, and on August 22, 1919, was promoted to First Lieutenant. Upon returning to the United States he had two ROTC details at the Virginia Military Institute and the University of Chicago, and later joined the faculty of the United States Military Academy.

He was assigned to the 11th Field Artillery in Hawaii and then returned to join the 7th Cavalry Brigade, Mechanized. On August 1, 1933, he was promoted to Captain. Assignments with the 1st and 4th Armored Divisions followed, and he later was transferred to the Armored Force School, where he served as an instructor in tactics. On April 18, 1940, he was promoted to Major and went on to serve on the Field Artillery Board.

On August 21, 1942, he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, and in October, 1942, he was assigned to the 100th Division as executive officer of Division Artillery. He was promoted to Colonel on November 30, 1942.

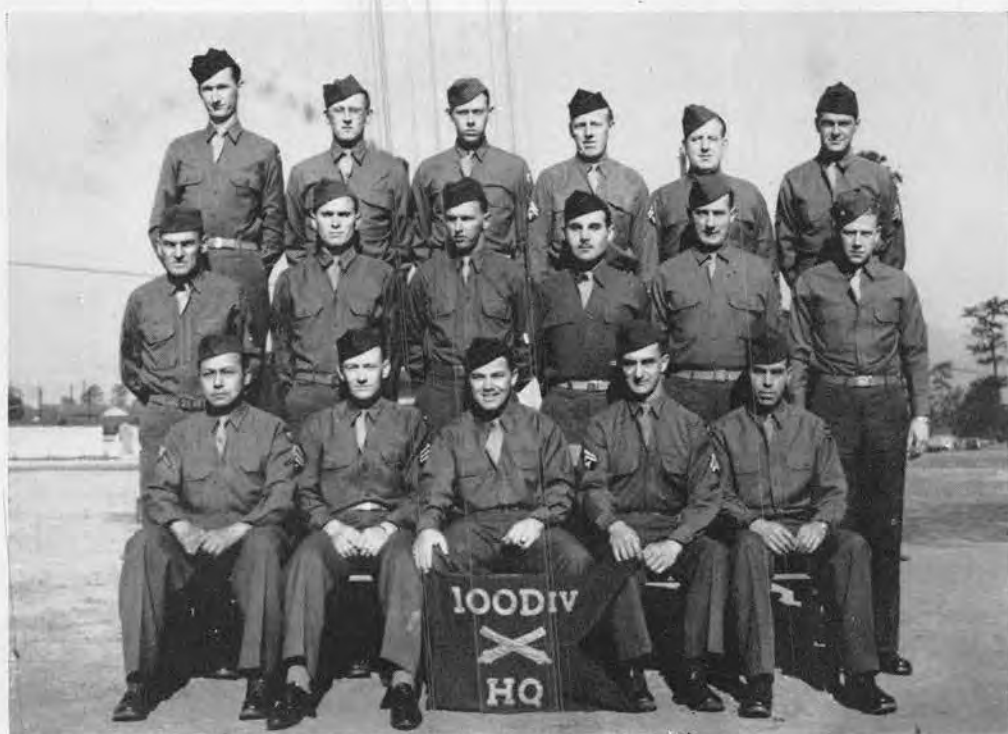

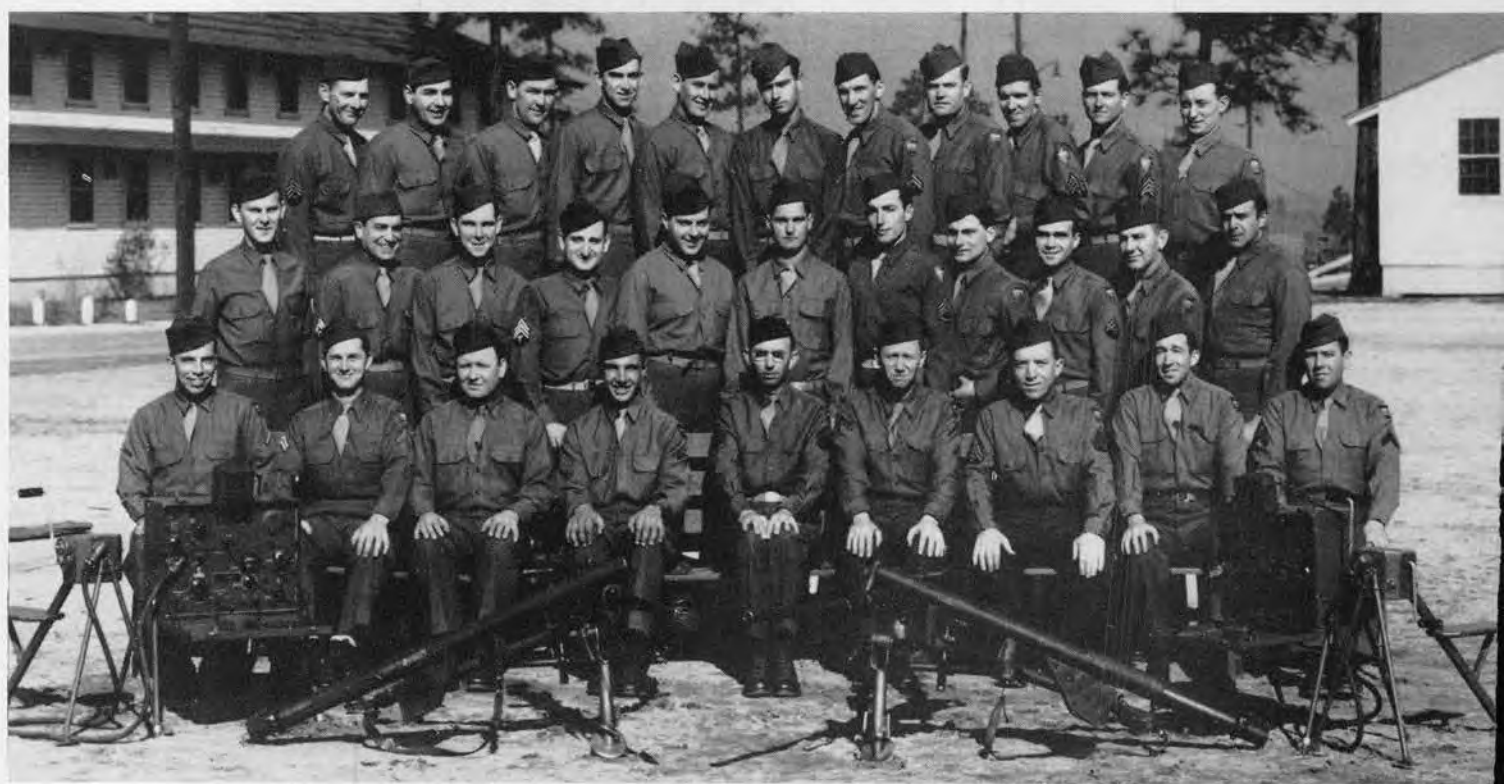

Lieutenant Colonel Walter Howard De Lange was born in Denison, Texas, on December 29, 1900, and attended Austin College, Sherman College and Texas A. & M., being graduated from the latter in January, 1923. On January 5, 1923, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Corps and served at Brooks Field and Kelly Field, Texas, until 1924. On June 5, 1924, he was transferred to the Field Artillery and assigned to the 12th Field Artillery. On November 1, 1927, he was promoted to First Lieutenant.

He attended the Battery Officers' Course in 1928 and was later transferred to the 13th Field Artillery in Hawaii. In 1932 he was assigned to the 4th Field Artillery, and on August 1, 1935, was promoted to Captain. The following two years were spent as Professor of Military Science and Tactics of the Tampa Public High Schools, Tampa, Florida, and in 1937 he was assigned to the 15th Field Artillery. He was promoted to Major on July 1, 1940, and was transferred to the 31st Field Artillery Regiment of the 7th Division; in May of 1941 he activated and assumed command of the 49th Field Artillery, also of the 7th Division.

He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel on February 1, 1942, and while attending the Division Artillery Course at the Field Artillery School he was assigned to command the 373rd Field Artillery Battalion. On November 15, 1942, he assumed command.

Lieutenant Colonel Claude Mancil Liles was born in Carbon, Texas, on August 27, 1900, and enlisted in the United States Army on May 23, 1917. He helped activate the 53rd Training Battalion and was promoted to Major in May, 1941. After commanding the 51st Field Artillery Battalion, he attended the Division Artillery Course at Fort Sill and was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel on August 8, 1942. In October, 1942, he was assigned to the 100th Division as commanding officer of the 374th Field Artillery Battalion.

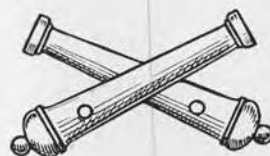
