BIOGRAPHICAL AND SUBJECT SUMMARY:

David Saltman served in World War II, having volunteered for the draft and being inducted at Fort Dix, N.J. on May 8, 1941. He left New York harbor in convoy in September 1944 and saw action in the Battle of the Bulge and was awarded the bronze star for participation with 5th Armored Division (Elbe River, Germany) Under General George Patton, during occupation of Germany, he served as Prisoner-of-War Hospital Security Officer for Third Army
