Marshall's "retirement" was busy indeed. Though no longer in uniform, Marshall continued to serve his country per Truman's requests.

- R. Truman first sent Marshall to China to negotiate for a coalition government which would favor the United States. He was unsuccessful. Beside Marshall are Madame Chiang Kai-shek, General Chiang Kai-shek, and General Eisenhower.
- S. While Secretary of State, Marshall met with these Cub Scouts who had devised a plan to show films in their hometown and send the profits to Europe. Marshall recounts this anecdote on track #2 of the CD.
- T. As President of the Red Cross from 1949-50, Marshall extensively toured chapters throughout the United States.
- U. Truman recalled Marshall to be his Secretary of Defense during the Korean War crisis. Note the U.S., South Korean, and United Nations flags in this multi-lateral operation.
- V. Marshall relaxes with his wife Katherine in retirement at their home, Dodona Manor, near Leesburg, Virginia. Dog Nato offers a clue as to yet another of Marshall's accomplishments during the Cold War era.
- W. Marshall receives the Nobel Peace Prize from Nobel Prize Committee President Gunnar Jahn at Oslo, Norway, 1953. He is honored for his role in initiating the European Recovery Plan.
